Lasting undesirable consequences may occur and cause profound victimization.

Adjunct Professor Karen L. Bune teaches victimology in the criminal justice department at GMU. Ms. Bune serves as a consultant for the Office for Victims of Crime, U.S. Department of Justice, and she is a nationally recognized public speaker and trainer. Ms. Bune is Board Certified in traumatic stress and domestic violence. She has received Diplomate status by the American Academy of Traumatic Stress Experts and the National Center for Crisis Management—a designation of specialization in one's field. She serves on the Institutional Review Board of the Police Foundation. Ms. Bune has worked in public service for 36 years and has been recognized with numerous awards.
