They also identified resources to ensure our community is alert and responsive to what human trafficking looks like and how to act responsibly. Contributions to Artemis House of dried goods, canned foods and gift cards were plentiful. As an outgrowth of the symposium, our branch will launch a "Safe Haven Campaign" that involves a small group study series for our members.
