For the many of us who came of age in the 1960's, the stalled progress on the pay gap has been frustrating and aggravating. In 2019, women as a group still made only 82 cents for every dollar earned by men. But the picture was even worse for Black women who made 72 cents and Latinas who made 54 cents. And the pay gap is only part of the **economic inequity** problem that continues to disadvantage women from their teens through their retirement. Then came the pandemic. The stalled progress has come to a screeching halt and women are facing long term economic losses from unemployment or from being forces to drop out of the workforce to deal with childcare and home schooling. **Nearly 3 Million women have left the labor force**. I am so passionate about these issues that I taught a course on the problem through George Mason University's OLLI Lifelong Learning Program and would like to have you join me for a presentation "Covid Crisis for Women's Equity" on Sunday, March 7 at 3PM. We are meeting at this special time to encourage you to bring your daughters and friends still in the workforce – all are welcome. Link on the links page.



Over the upcoming weeks we will be talking more about proposed changes to AAUW bylaws. AAUW's mission is to advance gender equity, yet the requirement for membership explicitly denies access to membership to those without college degrees. AAUW does not promote equity for all women and girls if the organization maintains exclusionary membership requirements. The membership requirement is not fair, is not right, and is not equity. Spotlight On: Mary Zane



In what she calls their "53-year odyssey," Mary Zane and her husband, Al, have packed in a lot of different experiences. The same goes for Mary's 15 years as an AAUW member.

The Zanes met in their hometown of Massapequa, NY, and married after Mary graduated from St. Vincent's Hospital School of Nursing in NYC. They started their Navy life in Pensacola, FL, where their first son was born. Mary tells the next moves: "Then onto Virginia Beach for eight years, and the arrival of sons #2 and #3. I volunteered for the county's Family Life program for moms and babies and was a first responder on our local fire and ambulance department. For the next four years, living on Mt. Etna in Sicily became our exciting home, we lived in an all-Italian neighborhood. During that time, I realized that becoming a school nurse was what I wanted to be, though I lacked a bachelors degree."

Then it was back to Long Island, where Mary obtained a school nurse position and served on an American Nursing Association negotiation team to improve salary and work conditions for nurses in the district.

"We – all women, of course – were paid an hourly wage and had zero benefits. If the school was closed for weather conditions or a holiday, we weren't paid. It was a fight every step of the way, but the results were gratifying. The number of school nurses was doubled and when the schools were closed for a week due to hurricane damage we were paid!"

Next the Zanes moved to England for five years where Mary served as the school nurse for American high school students whose parents were stationed in more than 30 locations across Europe, Russia and the Middle East.

"It was one of the most challenging and rewarding positions I have ever had. Along the way, bit by bit, I took college courses through the University of Maryland, and finally earned by BS in Nursing in 2000, with my youngest son graduating beside me at George Mason University!"

Three years later, it was off to Germany as empty nesters, where Mary received a Department of Defense Distinguished Service award for her work with American schoolchildren during their parents' deployment to Iraq. In 2006 the Zanes returned to the US and moved to Reston – and Mary found us.

"AAUW suddenly appeared in the form of an ad in the Connection newspaper for volunteer mentors at Forest Edge Elementary School. I was missing school and children and jumped at the chance. It was a perfect program for me, and when I was asked to join the branch and co-chair the program with Gail Parsons, I couldn't say no! We enthusiastically continued the program for seven years with the endorsement and support of Roberta Sherman, then Forest Edge vice principal. Recruiting and working with a group of women and men mentors over those years was so inspiring. Even now, some of our mentees, now in their 20s with families of their own, stay in touch." In the years since then, Mary has planned branch cultural outings, hosted a Russian agricultural economist in our branch exchange program in 2012, and, seven years ago, joined the AAUW Lobby Corps.

"My long ago experience in New York public schools, where women nurses were treated as second class citizens, empowered me to speak up for 'advancing gender equity through research, education and advocacy,' as AAUW's mission statement says."

Now Mary is co-chair of our branch Public Policy committee with Judi Polizzotti, hoping to return to personally visit congressional offices with other Lobby Corps members when conditions allow. She continues to work two or three days a week at the Falcons Landing retirement community in Sterling.

Later this year, all AAUW members in the United States will vote on a proposal made by AAUW's national board of directors to remove any educational requirement for membership in our organization. AAUW national president Kim Churches says that if AAUW is working for better conditions for all women, regardless of their educational background, then all women should be invited to join. Based on her own experience, Mary agrees, and supports the proposal.

"It doesn't require a college degree to work for gender equity. Our members bring an amazing wealth of experiences, perspectives, careers and expertise to the AAUW table. I am proud to be a member."

It was unfortunate that several Virginia bills supporting pay equity and banning salary history never made it out of committee. Of the other bills which were our policy priorities, there is one bill remaining in the VA legislature for Paid Sick Leave HB 2137 Delegate Guzman. In the Senate Commerce and Labor Committee, the bill was whittled down to include only home health care workers Please contact your State Senator and Delegate to support this important legislation. They need to hear from their constituents.

The Paycheck Fairness Act should be reintroduced in the US House of Representatives soon. Watch for more details in how you can support this important bill.

Marion Stillson sent along this article that she thought would be of interest to you all:

"The Teenager who gave history a shove"
A statue of Barbara Johns should replace Robert E. Lee in the U.S. Capitol

Barbara Johns was a 11th grader in 1951in a Farmville Jim Crow era school. She somehow sent her principal into town on a wild goose chase and urged all 450 of her fellow Black students to follow her on a walkout to protest shabby conditions. The school lacked a gym, cafeteria or lockers and was overcrowded. Student needed to wear their coats in winter to keep warm while the nearby white school had none of these problems. Barbara's act of defiance led to a lawsuit that landed in the Supreme Court and rolled into Brown v Board of Education, the landmark desecration case. Virginia advisory committee recommended that a statue of the late Barbara Johns replace that of Robert E. Lee in the U.S. Capitol's Statuary Hall. Johns' action of courage helped set in motion changes that reshaped Virginia's and American's basic concept of racial fairness. Under Thurgood Marshall's direction, the NAACP responded to her plea and incorporated the case into the broader crusade to end school segregation. John's was an unlikely catalyst. She had not previously been a student activist. After the school strike, her parents, alarmed at the threats she received, sent her out of state to finish high school. She later graduated from Drexel University. What she possessed on that day was the clear vision to perceive the injustice she lived through every day and the initiative to call it out and thereby giving history a shove!
