Janine Greenwood sent the following to the previous board and one of its members thought her thoughts were important to share with the entire membership:

I thought I would wait until the last day of my "reign" to write and thank you all for your indefatigable work and support over the last two years. Our successes and contributions to AAUW and our community has taken the work of all of us. None of what we accomplished would have happened without the work of each and every one of you. You have my undying gratitude.

This morning I began reading the book "The Barbizon: The Hotel That Set Women Free." Although the hotel opened in 1928 in the era of our mothers, the book reminded me once again of the seismic changes our particular generation of women have witnessed. Yes, we stood on the shoulders of those who came before us but, after the 1950's, we really were faced with reinventing our role in our families, in the workplace, and in society. Role models and mentors were thin on the ground. For myself, I came of age in a small mill town in that pivotal year of 1968. The "revolution" of the sixties certainly supported thinking outside conventional norms, but women were still seen as handmaids to this revolution. As I went off to college and then moved to New York for graduate school I knew I wanted to be "liberated" but had no idea what that meant, how I could do that, and hard it would be. I also had no idea that it was a fight I would still be fighting in 2021.

Which brings me to AAUW. Like many of you, I am concerned about the future of our organization and sometimes wonder if it will be able to outlive us. The younger generation defines equity more broadly. I support that. As "The Barbizon' points out even in its introduction, the women it "set free" were white and middle class. That is neither right nor fair. What concerns me is that if we do not have someone focusing on <u>women's</u> equity issue we will never resolve all that has become even more apparent over the last 18 months: the systematic inequity built into a nation that puts the caretaking burden only on the shoulders of <u>all</u> women. I do not say that the issue of women's inequity is more important than our many massive societal inequities – but I do believe it needs its own voice. For many years, AAUW has been a big part of that voice.

I think you all know how disappointed I was about the outcome of the vote on the degree requirement. Our organization needs to stand for and with all women. The vote makes us appear like the Barbizon – a place for middle class white women. And the reality is our members are aging women. The continued degree requirement is just one more barrier to attracting younger, diverse women who could contribute to our future.

So, the bottom line is, we need to keep fighting. All we do to build our sisterhood community is important and keeps us strong for the continued fight. Stay strong, stay active, stay engaged and reach out. Those of us who devoted our Thursdays to Lobby Corps will be keeping everyone in the loop on new opportunities to move the federal legislative agenda. Our new leadership is committed to keeping us engaged on the Virginia front. And I'm looking forward to programs that keep us prominent as a voice in our community. Let's make connections and tell our friends. In the words of the immortal RBG "Fight for the things that you care about..."

Public Policy - Judy Polizzotti and Mary Zane Co-Chairs

Ratification of CEDAW the Convention on the Elimination of all forms of Discrimination Against Women is an AAUW Public Policy Priority . Fairfax County is considering a resolution in support of CEDAW. Communities across the country have passed a similar resolution. If you would like to join me (Judy Polizzotti) at the virtual meeting of interested parties on September 14 at 7:15 pm, let me know and I'll forward the details.

The League of Women Voters of the Fairfax Area (LWVFA) again has offered us opportunities to work with their members to register voters this year. To be able to volunteer to do voter registration, you are required by state law to get credentialed each year after July 1. This involves watching a brief video (40 minutes) and then filling out an attestation. When you fill out the attestation you can list AAUW-VA or LWV Fairfax Area as your affiliated organization. If you are able to sign up for a shift (see Sign-Up Genius forms below).

Lobby Corps From Kate Nielson AAUW National Senior Director Public Policy, Legal Advocacy and Research: "Yes, lots of transition. In addition to Kim's departure, our federal policy manager, Letty Bustillos left in June. I will be able to provide more information on the possibility of Lobby Corps reconvening after Labor Day once we start to transition back to the office and I have more staff capacity. But as I said in my last email, I cannot promise that we will resume inperson lobbying this year. I appreciate your eagerness, but in large part the circumstances are out of my control. I just checked in with two staff members on the Hill to ask their opinion and was told their offices are only taking virtual meetings, and while guidance is supposed to be updated in the fall, with the Delta variant running rampant, they are skeptical of changes. EDUCATION COMMITTEE



The education committee met in July and will meet again on September 13 at 10:30 at the home of Roberta Sherman - 2950 Timber Wood Way, Herndon. We are always looking for others to join. Email Roberta at shermanrs1@aol.com if you plan to attend and for directions.

We will discuss our scholarships and a new incentive - a diversity prize for high school students at South Lakes and Herndon High Schools. To fund the diversity prize, we are considering applying to AAUW for a mini-grant. Below is information that we discussed at our last meeting.

How our scholarship should be structured:

The requirements for the scholarship will remain the same with a little tweaking. They are: full time or part time student, demonstrate financial need, be in good standing, have successfully completed 12 credit hours or more, be a returning student, be in STEAM field and submit an essay on "The importance of gender equality and how it has affected me or someone I know." The only difference here was to add the A to STEM. We would like to increase the amount to \$2000 a year.

Other Educational/Diversity Projects to consider:

From the Springfield Branch: Diversity Award - Each Spring the branch honors a Junior girl from the four high schools in our area – Annandale High School, Lake Braddock Secondary School, Lee High School and West Springfield High School – who has made a significant contribution to multi-cultural understanding in her school. The award is given to a Junior so she can put it on her college applications and scholarship applications and to encourage her to continue with her efforts. Award recipients have included girls who planned cultural fairs, researched and wrote about various cultures represented in the school, tutored, held events for Downs Syndrome students and mainstream students, introduced fellow students to their home countries through collections for orphanages and school construction, started a foundation to benefit low income preschoolers, and many more.

We discussed this program and really liked it and would like to put our own spin on it. From reading this blurb from their website, it appears that there is no money that goes with it. We would like to fund the awardees' project having some kind of cap. This is where we plan to ask AAUW for funds through a mini grant.
