

Patty Hagan: New Branch DEI chair

By now we all should know that DEI stands for "Diversity, Equality and Inclusion," a goal of AAUW and many other organizations in the country. Our branch can boast of having a member who is the AAUW state DEI chair, Cyndi Shanahan.

Now we can further brag that we have a new branch DEI chair with a long career focused on equal opportunity and diversity: Patty Hagan.

Before she started her own business, Lighthouse Coaching LLC, Patty worked for the federal government for 36 years, retiring in 2008 as the first Diversity Manager for the U.S. Geological Survey. In that position and others, she influenced changes in hiring, promotion and development practices affecting the composition of the workforce -- mostly through training managers on the legal requirements and advantages of having a diversified staff. She was also active in Federally Employed Women at the local, regional and national levels, working to help all women in the federal government succeed. For a while, she was an AAUW member at large, but never got involved.

"I had a plaque in my office that said, 'Only those who dream the absurd can achieve the impossible.' It showed a flying seagull carrying an elephant in its beak! That concept guided my federal career and continues to guide my coaching."

Patty continued her passion for healing racism by helping start the Social Justice Team at her Unity Church in Oakton. It was there that she met our branch member, Carol Bradley, who invited Patty to meet with her and Stephanie Abbott to discuss speaking at an AAUW branch meeting. In 2022, Patty spoke informally at a summer luncheon at Cafe Montmartre. In the fall, she presented an online class on "Unconscious Bias." Carol and Stephanie gifted her with an AAUW membership.

A native Virginian who grew up in Arlington and Springfield, Patty earned a BA in history at George Mason University and an MA in public administration at George Washington University. Throughout Covid, she took classes online and conducted two racial healing training courses for her church online.

"It was easier not to travel but I missed the in-person contact."

Patty sees her branch position as trying to bring more awareness of DEI and expand AAUW's DEI goals to include age diversity.

"We've got to find a way to reach out to new younger potential members; we need diversity in age, physical abilities and all components of DEI. I know that many groups are having this problem since younger people tend not to join groups. We must find solutions or we will not survive."

Since its formation in 1972, AAUW Action Fund Lobby Corps volunteers have made tens of thousands of in-person visits to congressional offices on behalf of AAUW members and supporters in their respected congressional district, placing a name and a face to our mission of advancing equity for women and girls. Lobby Corps volunteers are trained in how to effectively advocate AAUW's priority issues with members of Congress and their staff. Volunteers receive briefings on each issue topic before going on visits, and new Lobby Corps volunteers are paired with experienced members. Capitol Hill Lobby Days are typically held once a month when Congress is in session.

AAUW members and college students in the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area are welcome to join Lobby Corps. No experience or expertise is necessary—only a commitment to promoting AAUW's nonpartisan public policy priorities. #### **DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND INCLUSION – Patty Hagan**

I think by now we all know that diversity encompasses many human aspects, not just race and gender. It includes ethnicity, religion, age, color, abilities, sexual orientation, socio-economic background, and much more. But what does "equity" involve, and how do we make sure that everyone is included?

First, let's take a look at the difference between "equality" and "equity." I've seen a great meme which depicts this perfectly. It shows 3 people of various heights trying to watch a baseball game over a fence, but none of them are tall enough to see over it. The next scene shows the same people standing on boxes of equal heights. That allows the tallest person to see fine. One of the people is standing on his tip toes and can just barely peer over the fence, but not comfortably. The shortest person is still looking at the fence. The box sizes are equal but the effect isn't. The last picture shows everyone easily watching the game over the fence. Why? Because they now have different size boxes that work for their heights. That's "equity"; it allows everyone to have the same access regardless of their differences. One size doesn't necessarily fit all. Equity also ensures that historical disparities are rectified.

For most of us women, we understand "inclusion." In our workplaces, we often weren't included in meetings at all. And if we were, we were frequently the only woman there. We could make a suggestion that no one paid attention to. Moments later though, a man could make the same suggestion, even using our words, and everyone immediately agreed that it's a wonderful idea! We were at the meeting but our voices weren't "included" in the discussions.

AAUW works to ensure that DEI is part of our nation's educational system which is a microcosm of society. Numerous studies show that diverse teams outperform homogenous ones both in the workplace and academia. And as members of AAUW, it's important that we get and stay involved with what happens in education at all levels. Girls won't be interested in STEM careers if they're discouraged from learning math and science in elementary, middle and high school.

Making our voices heard at school board meetings is one way to help ensure that all children are provided quality education and feel safe in school, even if we don't have children in school. Virginia students are now facing challenges on how LGBTQIA students will be treated. Silence is compliance, so let's speak up in public, online, and in editorials! Let our elected officials know how we feel!

September 15 to October 15 is Hispanic Heritage Month. It spans 2 months to include the dates on which many Central and South American countries gained independence from their colonizers. Heritage months honor the contributions made by people from those groups which typically aren't in our history books. Many of us are familiar with Cesar Chavez and his work for the National Farmworkers Association. How many of us heard of Dolores Huerta who was an activist and civil rights leader? She was the cofounder of the National Farmworkers Association with Chavez, but we don't often hear

October 12 is now celebrated as Indigenous People's Day in most states. [Columbus just happened to land on what's now the Bahamas in his search for India.] Most of us learned about Pocahontas and Sacagawea because of their involvement with men, not for their own actions. We didn't study the many other indigenous women who worked hard for a land which was taken from them. The South Lakes food pantry was started in 2017 to help close the hunger gap for the 30% of the students who are on the free and reduced lunch program. It is currently serving over 150 families.

- Canned goods (peanut butter, jelly, beans, tomatoes/sauce, applesauce, chili, veggies, tuna/canned meat)
- Box/Dry goods (crackers, cereal, pasta, rice, lentils, boxed milk)
- Cooking oil
- Laundry detergent, dish soap
