I believe the following excerpt from the New York Times editorial says it all:

The past 100 days have wounded this country, and there is no guarantee that we will fully recover. But nobody should give up. American democracy retreated before, during the post-Reconstruction era, Jim Crow, the Red Scare, Watergate and other times. It recovered from those periods not because its survival was inevitable but because Americans — including many who disagreed with one another on other subjects — fought bravely and smartly for this country's ideals. Right to Contraception

Governor Youngkin has vetoed two critical birth control bills that passed out of the General Assembly with bipartisan support.

The Contraceptive Equity Act and the Right to Contraception Act would have strengthened protections for Virginians' access to contraception. These bills were about more than just birth control. Access to contraception is about protecting your health, your future, and your bodily autonomy.

Governor Youngkin's veto is a shameful rejection of what Virginians overwhelmingly support. It makes clear that he is willing to put politics ahead of personal freedom and basic health care. Virginians deserve leadership that trusts them to make their own decisions about their bodies and their lives.

Take action now by sending a message to Governor Youngkin and telling him Virginians deserve better.

Bill in Congress on Student Loans

AAUW is joining other organizations in pushing back against a bill in Congress that would do the following:

- 1. Punishes Student-Parents—Especially Black & Latina Mothers Raising the Pell "full-time" bar to 15 credits per term cuts grants for the very learners who rely on them most; 74% of student-parents are women and 55% are people of color.
- 2. Ends Subsidized Loans, Making College More Expensive for Women Eliminating subsidized Stafford loans means interest accrues while women are still in school, adding thousands to a balance they already struggle to repay because of the gender pay gap.

- 3. Slashes Federal Borrowing Power and Kills Grad PLUS New Ioan caps (\$50 k undergraduate, \$100K/ \$150K graduate & professional, \$200K lifetime) and the loss of Grad PLUS leave advanced degrees—especially in STEM, medicine, and law—financially out of reach for many women.
- 4. Cuts Off Parent PLUS—A Lifeline for Families of Color Restricting new Parent PLUS loans removes the only federal option many Black and low-wealth families have to close college-cost gaps, jeopardizing completion for women of color.
- 5. Locks Women into 30 Years of Debt The new "Repayment Assistance Plan" extends forgiveness to 360 monthly payments (30 years), deepening the debt drag on women who already take longer than men to repay and delaying wealth-building milestones.

May is National Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander (AANHPI) Heritage Month. This year's theme is "A Legacy of Leadership and Resilience." This theme is "...both a tribute and a call to action. We honor the achievements of those who have paved the way while igniting the passions of those who will follow. Through this theme, we strive to continue breaking barriers, honor our traditions, and inspire the next generation of AANHPI leaders." [https://fapac.org/AAPI-Resources] Established by Congress in 1977, President Jimmy Carter issued the first presidential proclamation recognizing the month in 1979. There are several museums in DC related to Asian American history including the Smithsonian Asian Pacific American Center, https://apa.si.edu.

May is also Jewish American Heritage Month. There is now evidence that Alexander Hamilton, one of our Founding Fathers, was Jewish. Research done by Dr. Andrew Porwancher looked at Hamilton's origins and determines that he was in all likelihood born and raised Jewish. (https://www.yu.edu/news/was-alexander-hamilton-jewish) President George W. Bush first proclaimed this heritage month in 2006.
